

Dr. Summers has 14 years conducting experience applied research and evaluation with the juvenile family courts, and specializing in child abuse and neglect court work.

Dr. Summers previously served as the Program Director for Research and Evaluation at the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges and currently serves as the Director of Research and **Evaluation for the Capacity Building** Center for Courts, providing technical assistance services to Court Improvement Programs all over the nation. Her research focus is on improving the quality of court hearings, examining compliance with Indian Child Welfare Act, using data in a meaningful way, and evaluating court programs practices to contribute to the growing evidence-base of what works.

She also serves as adjunct faculty at the University of Nevada, Reno for the Interdisciplinary Social Psychology and Judicial Studies programs.
