## Property 'from the ground up'

Property is a highly important, and contentious, issue worldwide. Property is embedded in political systems and intricately connected with life opportunities. But property theory is currently dominated by Anglo-American legal scholars whose perspective, even if not wholly derived from the law and economics movement, always centres on the individual owner of property rights. This is evident in the ongoing debate between scholars who view the right to exclude as the key to understanding property, and those who put forward the more progressive view founded on the idea of property as a bundle of rights. Drawing on insights from legal geography about property as performance, and from the commoning literature, I try to challenge conventional property scholarship by examining how property is actually constituted at the social level. My research methods are influenced by legal anthropology and my theory is built from empirical data, primarily observations and interviews. These demonstrate the collective, rather than individual, character of property.
